


The Beth Jacob Educational Building is located directly across the street from the site of the future home of the Kollél. Groundbreaking on the site is scheduled for November 2017.

COMMUNAL COMPLETION OF TRACTATE KIDDUSHIN AT LEARN-A-THON



The Denver Community Kollel held its 2nd annual Learn-A-Thon on Sunday, May 28th, 2017. Nearly 125 Jews from across Denver and Boulder participated in the Learn-A-Thon. Men and boys were given a folio of Tractate Kiddushin, joining together to complete the entire tractate in one hour. Women studied a prepared curriculum in small groups led by Kollel women.

Following the learning session, a *siyum* (completion ceremony) on Tractate Kiddushin was held. Participants celebrated with music and dancing, and refreshments were served in honor of the *siyum*.



BOYS' LEARNING AT THE KOLLEL



The Kollel once again offered its two highly-successful learning programs for boys in West Denver. The Kollel's Fathers & Sons program, which began with the shift of the clock to Daylight Savings Time and runs until Rosh Hashana, takes place on Shabbos afternoon. It features learning followed by refreshments and raffles for exciting prizes. On the second day of Shavuos, a special ice cream bar featuring numerous flavors of ice cream, toppings and cones was offered after the learning session.

Summer Night Seder for Bachurim begins when school ends. Boys from the community are invited to learn nightly at

the Kollel's night seder. Refreshments are provided, and a weekly monetary stipend is awarded to boys who attend consistently.

At summer's end, a special barbeque dinner was held for participants at the home of Mr. Joe Friedman. "It is great to see so many boys learning *bechavrusah* and with their fathers at the Kollel," says Mr. Friedman. "I am proud to support this program."


The demolition of the structure currently on the building site is scheduled for September 2017, and groundbreaking is slated for November 2017. The new Kollel Torah Center is projected to be completed in September 2018.

Securing funds for the future three-story, state-of-the-art home of the Kollel is moving ahead, as well. To date, the Kollel has cash and commitments of \$1,650,500, approximately 55% of its goal.


The Kollel is pleased to announce an exciting development in the building campaign. A large youth center is planned for the Kollel Torah Center. It will feature a space for a wide variety of Jewish-focused programming for children and teens. Several months ago, the Kollel applied for certification to provide Child Care Credits to donors. The Kollel was recently informed that it is indeed qualified to do so.

“This is a game-changer for our fundraising efforts,” says Bob Weiss. “We are looking forward, with Hashem’s help, to continued success as we continue to have conversations with potential donors who are interested in partnering with the Kollel to build the future of Torah in Denver.”



AN INTERVIEW WITH OUTGOING GOLD DIRECTOR JOYCE LITZMAN



Joyce Litzman has served as the director of the Kollel's M.B. Glassman Foundation GOLD Senior Division for the past 2 ½ years. This summer, Mrs. Litzman announced that she is giving up the position as she and her husband, Avraham, are relocating to Baltimore. The Denver Kollel Connection conducted an interview with Mrs. Litzman about her tenure with GOLD.

DKC: Describe your experience with the weekly GOLD Lunch & Learn.

JL: When I started with the Kollel, GOLD consisted of a weekly free Lunch & Learn at the East Side Kosher Deli. At that time, the Lunch & Learn was attracting four to six people on a weekly basis. The Lunch & Learn now attracts between 40 to 45 people, and has topped 50 on a number of occasions. The Lunch & Learn has evolved into much more than a free lunch. The attendees come to learn about the weekly parsha from [Kollel Senior Educator] Rabbi Fleisher. They are not shy about asking questions and will challenge Rabbi Fleisher. I am very proud of the fact that I have played a part in connecting these seniors to a Jewish mentor.

DKC: What other programs began through GOLD, and what do they offer?

JL: I reached out to assisted living and retirement villages and asked if they thought there was a desire for Jewish

programming at their facilities. GOLD now goes into four different senior retirement facilities throughout the year to offer Jewish programming focused upon the Jewish calendar. The seniors are very grateful to us for bringing such quality programs to where they live. I feel that programs such as these have truly impacted the lives of the Jewish seniors living in these facilities.

Numerous other events and programs have been offered by GOLD, including a weekly thought on the parsha, a Purim party and a pre-Shabbos "Shabbos" meal at Rabbi Fleisher's home, the *Live & Learn* speakers series, weekly small-group *chavurah* learning, and Chanukah candle-lighting programs.

DKC: As you leave this position, what are your thoughts about GOLD?

JL: Most of the seniors who come to the programs have been a part of my life for the past 2 ½ years. They inquire about my family and they miss me when I am not at the Lunch & Learn. These people have become my friends. I will truly miss them.

But more than anything else, I am proud and delighted that I have had the opportunity to make a real difference in the lives of so many seniors and to give them the opportunity to learn about their Judaism and help make their lives more meaningful. I would like to thank the M.B. Glassman Foundation and the Kollel for that opportunity, and I wish them continued success in their special work.

"Through his deep knowledge and understanding of Torah, we were provided with an in-depth explanation of what the goal of *galus* is, and what Klal Yisroel should be attempting to accomplish while in *galus*."

"Each of the Kollel members presented in a distinct style," says Elisheva Hoffman. "There was something for everyone."

Dr. Michael (Mickey) Gordon, MD, is a renowned hand surgeon and an associate professor of plastic and reconstructive surgery at the University of Colorado's School of Medicine. For nearly eighteen years, he has been studying weekly with the Kollel.

"I had spent several years seeking someone to study with," relates

Dr. Gordon, "but the usual people at my synagogue at that time were not available to participate in one-on-one studying.

"I saw an event to introduce the Kollel to Denver, and I attended the learning session. Afterwards, I approached the speaker, Kollel Dean Rabbi Shachne Sommers, and he invited me to join the Kollel for weekly study sessions. I was thrilled to begin the journey, as that was just what I had been looking for. I began coming to the West Side on Thursdays and have continued since then."

Dr. Gordon studies with Kollel Dean Rabbi Aron Yehuda Schwab, and the two have completed a number of works on Jewish thought by the great Rabbi Moshe Chaim Luzzatto, better known as the Ramchal.

"We have studied *Derech Hashem*, *Mesilas Yesharim*, and *Maamar Hachochma*, and we are currently studying *Da'as Tevunos*," says Rabbi Schwab. "Learning with Mickey has given me the

opportunity to study these deep works very thoroughly. Mickey is a sharp thinker. He won't speak until he thinks through his comment or question very well."

Dr. Gordon studied with past Outreach Director Rabbi Yehuda Amsel for more than a decade, as well.

"Most of our learning focused on astronomical areas of halacha – understanding the Jewish calendar, the lunar cycle, the solar year vs. the lunar year," says Rabbi Amsel. "Dr. Mickey's vast knowledge in astrology and in many other areas made it possible to learn and understand the subject matter."

Following Rabbi Amsel's departure in 2012, Rabbi Yossi Kaplan studied with Dr. Gordon. Currently, he is learning with Rabbi Chaim Yeshia Freeman, who joined the Kollel this past fall. The two study halachic issues that arise in the medical field.

"Nothing gets by Dr. Gordon without deep thought," says Rabbi Freeman. "He is very bright and brings an incredible knowledge of medicine to our discussions, which truly enhances our learning."

"My understanding of my beliefs has grown exponentially since beginning to learn," says Dr. Gordon. "What I have learned has confirmed what I have always felt deep in my soul, and it has given me an outlet to express those things and incorporate them into my day-to-day life. I cannot imagine what I would be like if I had not encountered the Kollel and found a way to make learning a part of my life."

The Kollel offers one-on-one chavrusah learning to any Jew interested in learning Torah, regardless of background, observance, or level of learning, and countless Jews across the greater Denver area have benefited from these learning sessions during the past nineteen years. The Ohr Avner community has seen much growth in recent years, and the recent construction of a beautiful, state-of-the-art *mikvah* is the latest step in that growth. The Kollel's in-depth study strengthened the bond with the members of Ohr Avner, as discussions took place regarding the ongoing construction of the *mikvah*.

In late July, Mikvah USA, a Brooklyn-based organization that assists *mikvah* projects across the country and has been involved in the Ohr Avner *mikvah* since its early stages, arranged for Rabbi Nachman Horowitz of Mikvah USA to fly to Denver/Aurora for the final inspection of the *mikvah* prior to the rain collection necessary to make the *mikvah* operational. Rabbi Zions arranged for the Kollel

scholars to join Rabbi Horowitz for the informative inspection. This was followed by a discussion and question and answer session in the Kollel with Rabbi Horowitz, as he discussed previously submitted questions as well as various aspects of the Ohr Avner *mikvah*.
